Alumni House Manager's Report (by Trustee Paul Exner '71)

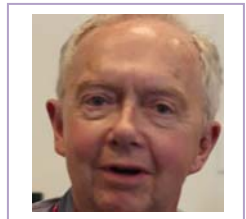
Thank our lucky stars that Craig Lazenby continues as our property manager and handyman. Working with the active Chapter, he was able to manage inspections by the City and our insurance carrier with NO concerns identified. I'd bet that this is a first. In his handyman role, Craig has continued to repair and paint our iconic fire escape - mostly replacing rotting parts with new pressure treated lumber. He also replaced the Tech-side bulkhead door, artfully filled the 1st floor abandoned heating registers (we have a new heating system), bricked-up basement windows, managed some new electrical service, kept the refrigerator running, and overall kept the Chapter House running smoothly. Craig and I also continued our work on a preliminary design for the kitchen remodeling project. The construction is scheduled to occur during the 2019 summer recess.

How Did We Get The Current Chapter House?

We had a lot of great help from the school. Dean Downing was the person we talked to. I was on the finding committee. It was the end of our sophomore year when we realized that Hackfeld Road wasn't going to do much beyond the next year - it was just too small. So, we went and talked to the dean and asked if there was any kind of way we could purchase a house; did the school have any housing? And it turns out that they had this place (Dean Street). It was a rooming house for school housing. They had completely divided up the whole place into individual rooms - it was in shambles to tell you the truth. We found out that anyway (remember - this was 1964 - the numbers were less startling than they would be today) that the house was available to us; the dean said that the school was willing to sell to us for fifty thousand dollars. So, we had to come up with a mortgage (which the school was willing to provide for us) and the down payment (which I think was no more than 10%). We had to come up with five grand which was about a years' pay for someone getting out of WPI at that point in time.

So, we scratched our heads a bit because none of us had that kind of money. We came up with this scheme to create a Psi Theta Nu bond. And, as brothers we each picked up a bunch of these and said: "Oh, we'll go find friends and family, relatives, whatever and see if they'll buy the bonds". And we had a little pitch that said: "Here's what we're trying to do, we're a new fraternity, we're trying to expand our base, we need some money to buy the house and get it fixed so we can use it next year". We had a couple of meetings with the parents who came over to Hackfeld Road. The upshot of that was the parents, in spite of their having to come up with our tuition, (tuition, room and board back in 1961 was 1,300 dollars), also came up with the money we needed by buying these bonds. It was a 25 year bond and we were paying the going interest rate which was 4 or 5 percent at that time. The denomination of the bond was whatever you wanted to give. It took a lot of faith on the part of these people - relatives and parents, to come up with the money and hand it over to a bunch of college students who were only going to be there another year anyway and with the prospect of a long period of time getting the money back - if ever.

Happily, we'll never know why they had such faith in us; but they did. That's really how we managed to get the money together. That money plus the mortgage that we took out was sufficient to let the school grant us access to this building and break down the walls and satisfy whatever we had at that time for fire requirements for the City of Worcester. It was the school that held the mortgage. We wouldn't have been able to do any of this if it hadn't been for the dean's commitment to the fraternity system.

PTN Treasurer's Report (by Bruce Hillson '71)

I am pleased to report that PTN's finances are stable for the present and short term future; and should become very solid in about six years.

Our operating budget for the 2018 calendar year is \$153,000. All income for the operating budget is derived from the rent paid by Sigma Pi to PTN. Donations and summer rents are above and beyond the normal rent and are earmarked for our Capital Improvements Account, and used exclusively for major projects to improve the House.

Since 2014 the Board has made significant improvements to our single physical asset, the House. We have identified several additional projects that need to be done. Most urgently are renovations to the kitchen. This project will be financed by a combination of donations and yet another bank loan. The loan amount will be determined by the amount we are able to raise through donations from alumni. Other needed improvements to the house include replacing the weathered and worn siding, redoing the roof and updating all the rooms. While these projects can be put off for the foreseeable future, they will be addressed as quickly as money becomes available through alumni donations. (Continued on Page 8)

Paying off our existing loans over the next six years will create a very solid financial position for PTN. The money not used for the monthly loan payments will be available to complete the remaining major projects, and/or saving for future improvements. It's been several years since PTN has had surplus money, so the expected funds will provide breathing room for the future Board to do general maintenance to preserve our investment.
