# President's Report (by Joe Staszowski)

On behalf of the PTN trustees, I'd like to extend our best to you and your family for a healthy and prosperous 2020.

PTN and the undergraduate chapter are doing well. Financially, the rent payment is adequate to pay PTN's anticipated expenses, existing mortgage costs plus payments on the new 20 year loan entered into this year to finance the kitchen upgrade and dining hall floor replacement project. The hope is to pay off the kitchen loan within 10 years. Our current funds don't support any major projects until the first mortgage is paid off.

The undergraduate Chapter continues to be well respected on campus with 68 brothers and 24 new members, a 3.44 GPA and strong campus and community involvement.

The Tech side showers were renovated during winter break. Now, all "immediate need" projects have been completed (although we know surprises can always occur). However, the House is showing its age, so additional work will always be required to keep the House safe and in good condition.

At the June annual meeting, five trustees were elected to PTN, Lorri (Lind Caruso) Byrne '73 (retired), Kris Rosado '89 (Morgan Stanley) and Derek Heard '91 (DXC Technology). The current officers elected by the trustees in August are President - Joe Staszowski '73, Vice President - Harry Kasparian '73, Treasurer - Bruce Hillson '71, House Manager - Lorri Byrne '73 and Secretary - Chris Hammer '18.

Next year, WPI's Reunion weekend will be May 29-31 with special events for graduating classes with years ending in 0 or 5. PTN will hold its annual meeting on May 30 (details to follow in the coming months; but save the date). Elections will be held for three trustee positions. Please consider sharing your experience and knowledge to help PTN and Gamma lota. Email and teleconference makes participation from anywhere possible.







I'm excited to announce the launch of our *2020 Capital Campaign* seeking to raise \$20,000 in donations by the end of 2020.

# Meet Our WPI Chapter Advisor - Officer Robert Vandal

Robert (Bob) Vandal is the current Chapter Advisor for Gamma Iota. His involvement with our chapter makes for a very interesting story. Bob is not a professor, but is on the staff of the WPI campus police; not your normal qualifications for a chapter advisor.

Officer Vandal says that he first wanted to be a fire fighter; but an opportunity with the Shrewsbury Police Department came sooner. Bob is 63 years old, married, and has spent the past 43 years "on the street", the last 23 of them with the campus police. He was first introduced to the Gamma lota Chapter when he served as a liaison for campus Greek Life, giving safety talks and risk management training. During a dark period at Gamma lota, Bob responded to some incidents at the House and became close with a couple of chapter members. In 2004, we needed a chapter advisor and a couple of guys asked him to serve temporarily in that position. "I didn't know if I could do this as a police officer," Bob said, recalling that he needed to check with the WPI Police Chief and school administration. He was given the go-ahead to assume the role of adviser, a position he thought would be very brief. A few weeks turned into three months and then six months and finally Sigma PI announced it had arrived at a decision for a permanent adviser. Their choice surprised Mr. Vandal. "They wanted me. I agreed to try it for a year," Mr. Vandal said.

Fifteen years later, Bob Vandal is still offering advice and serving as a liaison between the fraternity and the university, and, most important, being a mentor and offering a listening ear. Not only do the chapter members cherish his advice, they have welcomed him as a brother. In 2013, Dave Magnano proposed that Bob become a full-fledged brother of Sigma Pi. The vote was unanimous to extend a pledge invitation to Officer Vandal. He didn't have a hell week nor did he do pushups to get signatures in a gig book. However, he did some pledge training and, at a formal initiation attended by the full chapter, he became Magnano's little brother.

The undergraduates of Gamma lota Chapter have consistently remarked over the years that the relationship with Bob is a bond that is really special. The feeling is mutual for Officer Vandal. He warns, "I am always a police officer, first and foremost; so you better be good!" He stops by the Chapter House regularly and attends house meetings periodically. Bob says that after the students graduate, many become his Facebook friends.

January is the time for a new slate of officers to take over at the house. This year's Sage is Lucas Falsarella Guerreiro, an international student from Brazil.


Lucas was born in Valinhos, Brazil, a city of about 120,000 people, 300 miles west of Rio de Janeiro. When he was 11, his family moved to Mexico City for two years, then to Closter, New Jersey for another two years before moving back to Brazil where he attended an international high school.

Lucas considered colleges in the US as well as Brazil. He decided WPI was the right fit for him. He initially was focused on Aerospace Engineering at WPI but switched to Electrical & Computer Engineering partially due to the likely difficulties an international student could have getting government clearance to work in the Aerospace industry. He hopes to focus on hands-on Computer Engineering after graduation. He will be the first engineer in his family.

Not being from the US, Lucas' familiarity with fraternities was just what he read in the press which wasn't flattering. He rushed for just a few days freshman year, and then decided fraternities were not for him. Sophomore year he decided to give fraternities a more in-depth look. He rushed several fraternities, but based on recommendations from friends and his interaction with brothers during rush, he decided Sigma Pi was right for him. Once a brother, he volunteered to be Assistant Risk Manager. He enjoyed this role so when the Risk Manager position opened up A term 2019, he stepped up to that position. He must have done a great job because the brothers, beginning of B term, elected him Sage for 2020.
